

I am a nurse working in early intervention. This is a great resource book for the provider working with children with disabilities and developmental delays. I like the way she talks about all subjects from Autism, to hearing loss, to motor delays, to fetal alcohol syndrome, to speech and language delays, and to the importance of play. She talks about occupational therapists and how they can adapt equipment to help modify the problem: whether it be eating, motor or cognitive. She gives overviews of Spina Bifida, amputations, multiple sclerosis, muscular dystrophy, cerebral palsy, and visual impairments. If you are out in the trenches working with the children, you realize how valuable this book really is. I don't think as a student sitting in a classroom you can appreciate it.
